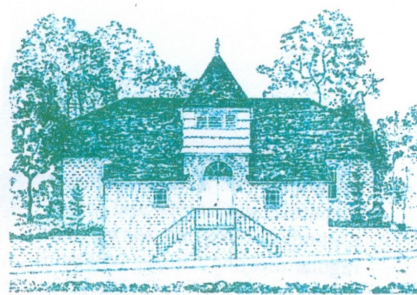

Page 41 - ARTICLE IV – Dues Section 2, Paragraph 1

- Strike \$65.00. Insert \$85.00

Annual dues for Active Members shall be \$85.00 per capita and shall include Club, General Federation, State and District dues.

Page 41 – ARTICLE IV – Dues Section 2, Paragraph 2

- Strike \$85.00. Insert \$105.00

Annual dues for Associate Members shall be \$105.00 per capita and shall include Club, General Federation, State and District dues.

Notes from the meeting on 3/1/10:

Councilman Kevin Kamenetz addressed the group stating that Baltimore County is financially sound. Other facts that were included in his talk: The snow budget was \$6 million; \$20 million has been spent so far. 40% of Baltimore County is declared rural; 80% of the population lives on 30% of the land. **The Reisterstown Volunteer Fire Dept.** building addition is nearing completion. It will provide quarters so volunteers will be readily available 24/7. The RVFD response time is among the best in the state.

At a special hearing, **Giant Foods** in the Cherryvale Shopping Center requested a permit for 361 parking spaces in lieu of 472 in order to accommodate 5 fuel pumps in the area between the building and Reisterstown Road.

History Highlights

During World War II, our club was involved in many worthwhile activities on the home front. One project was to use the money usually spent for the annual club party to help furnish the recreation room at Camp George G. Meade. War stamps and war bonds were sold through the club. The club purchased a service flag in honor of members' husbands and sons who were in the armed forces. Stars were purchased to represent individual men who were in every branch of the service and on every battlefield. By the end of the war, the flag displayed 47 stars, 3 of which were gold denoting those killed. Members were active as air raid wardens, students of home nursing and of nutrition, airplane spotters, blood donors, members of a motor corps,

bandage rollers in city hospitals, and faithful seamstresses and knitters for the Red Cross. As early as March 1943, 3006 garments and 721 knitted items had been made. The Red Cross work continued beyond wartime for an additional 20 years.
