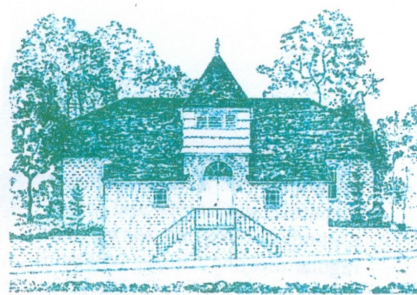

Notes from the meeting on 4/5/10:

Baltimore County Police have arrested a man charged with a murder on Strawhat Rd. and another man responsible for several burglaries on E. Cherry Hill and Delight Roads. **Officer Appreciation Day** will be at the Reisterstown Precinct on June 5.

A public hearing on **Wind Turbines and Rosewood Property** will be held on April 19 immediately following the Baltimore County Council meeting.

The request for five fuel pumps and 57 fewer parking spaces at **Giant Foods** (Reisterstown Rd and Cherry Valley Rd.) has been approved.

Plans are “in the works” for a community meeting regarding **Main Street Revitalization** on June 4 and 5. Representatives are to bring ideas from their organizations to the May ROG meeting. Let me know what you envision for Main St. and what would encourage your presence to eat, shop, etc?

History Highlights

In a previous article it was noted that our clubhouse (the former Glyndon School) was one of the nine structures whose architecture qualified Glyndon for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places. What is the National Register? It is a list of properties acknowledged by the federal government as worthy of preservation for their significance in American history and culture. The National Register is maintained by the Secretary of US Department of the Interior and administered by the National Park Service. Certain state and federal regulatory protections, financial assistance and tax benefits are available. In Maryland, the National Register program is administered by the Maryland Historical Trust.

Our property is also part of the Glyndon Historic District designated by the Baltimore County Landmarks Commission. Among the benefits of a county historic district are the encouragement for structures to remain in productive use (either for the original purpose or through adaptation to a new use) and reviews to ensure that exterior changes maintain a property's historic integrity and that new construction projects are compatible in size and architecture to existing buildings. The excavation, construction, alteration, moving, demolition or erection of any building, wall, fence or other structure within the district requires a historic permit from Baltimore County. The

Landmarks Preservation Commission must review and approve the historic permit application guided by Secretary of the Interior Standards. Although this commission has authority over the exterior appearance and design of a project, normal county zoning, environmental and building laws regulate other aspects of developing and using a property.
