

Welcome to ESO, Sherry Maxwell (Joppatowne) and Jennifer Adkins (Cecil County).

Sherry recommends Tina Fey's *Bossypants;* Suzanne Collins' *Hunger Games;* Jeannette Walls' *Glass Castle* and, much to her surprise, E.L. James' *Fifty Shades of Gray.* 

Jennifer and her book club recommend Jacquelyn Tobin & Raymond Dobard's Hidden in Plain View: A Secret Study of Quilts and the Underground Railroad. They were surprised to find this book under Arts, not American History, on the ESO reading list. We agree Sara Gruens' Water for Elephants is a must read.

I made my umpteenth visit to Charleston—a city that always wraps her arms around me and says, "Welcome Home." Upon returning to Maryland, I scrambled to find my copy of Pat Conroy's *South of Broad*. Why did I wait so long to read such a good book?

I recently discovered Lisa See's Shanghai Girls. I was surprised how modern Shanghai was in the 1930's. This is a story of two sisters who love each other unconditionally and will do anything to prove that love. Once addicted to Lisa, pick-up Snowflower and the Magic Fan and China Dolls—"talented Grace, traditional Helen and defiant Ruby meet by chance at the exclusive and glamorous Forbidden City nightclub in 1938 San Francisco. The girls become fast friends. But, after the Japanese attack Pearl Harbor, paranoia and suspicion threaten to destroy their lives, and a shocking act of betrayal changes everything.

Sarah's Key by Tatiana DeRosnay: In 1942, ten year old Sarah is taken from her parents by the French police as they go door-to-door arresting Jewish families. Desperate to protect her younger brother, Sarah locks him in a bedroom cupboard—a secret hiding place. This action will haunt Sara all of her days. Sixty years later, Sarah's story intertwines with that of Julia, an American journalist. In her research, Julia stumbles onto a trail of secrets that link her to Sarah and the fate of her little brother.

Bill O'Reilly's Killing Patton—The facts surrounding Patton's death are disturbing to say the least. Add to your list O'Reilly's Legends and Lies: The Old West.

Series that never seem to end: Robyn Carr's *Virgin River* and Fern Michaels' *Sisterhood*. Although clearly written and easy reading, I've gotten awfully tired of these people. After the fourth book, I found I didn't give a good flip what happened to them. Only Nora Roberts seems to understand "trilogy!"

On the other hand, I never tire of James Patterson's Alex Cross, Mike Bennett or Lindsay Boxer. These stories are never stale. Patterson's books are interesting, edge of the seat, well-written with short chapters that you can finish before you fall asleep. Don't you hate to drift off in the middle of a chapter?

But here's a trilogy we can sink our teeth into. Southern Living's August issue ran a tiny ad for Morgan Murphy's Second Helpings, Off the Eaten Path and On the Road Again, for people who love southern food—part cookbooks; part delicious journeys. "The ultimate foodie road trip to the south's most tucked-away highway-diners, drive-ins and dives." Intrigued? Me too.

I am embarrassed to say that in recommending a favorite book, Song Yet Sung, I credited the wrong author. It's James McBride not Edward Jones. Song Yet Sung is a story of Maryland's Eastern Shore and escaped slaves. This is where I met Patty Cannon. For years I'd heard the name "Patty Cannon," always assuming (quite incorrectly) that she was a Juliette Lowe, a Betsy Ross, a Florence Nightingale. Wrong, wrong, wrong. Patty is so morbidly enthralling. "It has been said that she had a handsome, fascinating face and was the most celebrated woman criminal in the history of Maryland and Delaware. She was a queen of kidnappers and murderers; the wickedest woman ever to walk on American soil."

2011 marked the 50th Anniversary of Harper Lee's, *To Kill a Mockingbird.* 



At that time I urged everyone to read it, whether for the first or the third time. The newly released sequel, *Go Set a Watchman*, sold 1.1 million copies (hardcover, e-books, etc.) within the first week of release. Scout returns home, for whatever reason, to find Atticus to be a bigot and a racist. What's that all about? I guess we have to read the book. Maybe we'll forgive, but we'll never forget.

As a gift, I received *It's a Long Story* by Willie Nelson and David Ritz. I so love Raggedy Willie. Like Johnny Mercer (whose story we reviewed in 2011), Willie has written some of the best music of our time—"Crazy," "Funny How Time Slips Away," "Blue Eyes Crying in the Rain," and "On the Road Again" (which Bill and I sang every February on our way to Key West), to name just a few.

Each club has a school or two they support. Why not form a kids reading club? There are wonderful books on the children's reading list from Katie Couric's *The Brand New Kid* to Maurice Sendak's *Where the Wild Things Are*. Whether you read to or with a class, a monthly visit to a school for an hour of reading is time well spent.

Winter is the best time for reading not summer (there's too much activity at the beach). I'll read some new releases—Bill O'Reilly's *Old West*; bestseller *Girl on a Train* and Lucia St. Clair Robson's, *Devilish*. And for good measure, I'll add in some old favorites—Ann Patchett's *Bel Canto*; F. Scott Fitzgerald's *Great Gatsby*; Pat Conroy's *The Great Santini* and *Death of Santini*. So many books; so little time!

Ever wonder at the amount of knowledge we absorb while enjoying a good novel? A story can break your heart—Sarah's Key, Song Yet Sung and South of Broad; Bossypants will make you laugh out loud; others will give you pause to say, "I didn't know that." The

ESO suggests each state put together its own reading list. In a flash, some wonderful Maryland authors came to mind: Tom Clancy, Leon Ursis, Upton Sinclair, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Dashiell Hammet, Edgar Allen Poe, Nora Roberts, Lucia St. Clair Robson\*, Laura Lippman, Ann Tyler, James Michener, Marcia Talley—just to name a few. You have your work cut out for you. Help put together our Maryland Reading List.

\* This is a purely personal point of view but if I had my way #1 on the Maryland list of recommended reading would be Lucia St. Clair Robson's *Mary's Land*—historical fiction at its best. "Lucia breathes life into facts and humanity into history with her unique ability to create extraordinary characters."

Each night before you sleep enjoy a few selections from Walt Whitman's *Leaves of Grass* and know that all is right with the world.

In closing, keep in mind what Christopher Robin said to Winnie the Pooh: "Promise me you'll always remember: you're braver than you believe and stronger than you seem and smarter than you think."

The GFWC Maryland Federation of Women's Clubs, Inc. will hold its September Board of Directors Meeting on Tuesday, September 15, 2015. The meeting will be hosted by Western District at the Best Western Catering & Conference Center in Westminster, MD. Directions are included in Call.

The speaker will be MaryLynn Hinde, Director of Operations for SHIP of Frederick County. With a history of excellence in non-profit organizational management, Mary-Lynn Hinde is a leading community advocate and organizer in Frederick County. A recipient of the 2015 Gov. William Donald Schaefer Helping People Award, MaryLynn was recognized for "her ability to improve the community by directly providing aid to those most vulnerable in society." A resident of Frederick city since 2004, MaryLynn has served as a leader within several local human service organizations including Student Homelessness Initiative Partnership (SHIP) of Frederick County, On Our Own, Frederick County Coalition for the Homeless, and Housing First Now Frederick. Prior to her move to Frederick, MaryLynn worked for

the South Florida chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, the San Antonio (TX) chapter of The Komen Foundation, and the Multiple Sclerosis Society, Greater Delaware Valley chapter. 



We continue to support the Perry Point Veterans facility. Plans to go there in November and December of 2014, as well as February 2015, had to be shelved until May 22, 2015 because of snow. Another deterrent for our members was the fact that our president's husband, John Tilley, was in five different hospitals eleven times from August 2014 to January 27, 2015 when doctors finally figured out what the problem was and successfully operated on his heart at St. Agnes Hospital.

Our trip to Perry Point produced a van and a car filled with used men's and women's clothes, and a huge box of chocolates donated by one of the ladies who attends our meetings when she can. We met at the home of a charter member, who prepared a continental breakfast for the five members going to the veterans facility. We filled white plastic shoe boxes with items donated by members that the veterans could enjoy in their hospital rooms. We tied the boxes with a red ribbon, a blue bow and put heart stickers on the top as our "Gift of Love." We concluded the day with a late lunch on the way back to Fallston.

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#### BALTIMORE DISTRICT REPORT

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Since April is "National Autism Awareness Month," and their color is blue (like Heart Month is red). members were asked to wear blue to the meeting. Those who wore blue received a raffle ticket, with two winners each receiving a blue bag which contained blue items. When the club voted to make a \$60.00 donation to the Autism Society. one of our friends who attended the meeting donated an additional \$40.00. This project is important to our club, because one of our members has a seven year old grandson who is autistic.

We have sponsored a HOBY 10th grade student at the Fallston High School ever since the Maryland Federation began supporting HOBY about 30 years ago. We have the student come to one of our meetings every other year.

We do a lot of fun things like a swim party and luncheon at the home of our president's daughter. We even go to the "Tea by Two" tea room in Bel Air sometime in Spring or Summer. At our last meeting in June each year, the president asks the girls if they want to dress up for a little contest with prizes. We have had a crazy Ear Ring Contest, Innovative Silly Clothes Contest, Hoe-Down Outfit and this past June, a Hat Contest for the most original hat, prettiest hat and goofiest hat. The prizes are always silly but usable. This June 2015, even the hostess of the Silver Spring Mining Company restaurant had on the silliest hat and won that category—and she even wants to join our club.

We had our 37th Birthday Celebration on March 10, 2015 at the Olive Garden restaurant in the White Marsh Mall area. We also celebrated St. Patrick's Day and Easter at the same time. Many of the programs at our meetings are presented by the

club president because our membership is too small to invite someone from "outside."

Every second Wednesday of the month, our club supports the making of 1000 peanut butter and jelly sandwiches at Oak Crest retirement facility that are given to the homeless and poor of Baltimore the next morning. Of those, 400 go to The Helping-Up Mission, and the rest go to various shelters in downtown Baltimore. Each month, our members and friends donate about twenty jars of smooth peanut butter and grape jelly for the sandwiches. The bread is also donated. The president has taken her granddaughter Megan Scarry and her brother Ben to this function since they were the ages of 14 and 10. Megan is now in her first year of college, but Ben still goes if his school activities permit. The senior residents at Oak Crest love having the younger ones come out to help. One of our members, the late May Wilson, had moved to Oak Crest and got us involved with this worthwhile ongoing project.

For all of 2014 we helped one of our own members in her recovery from a horrible car accident. We supplied her with cooked dinners for over a month, then shelf staple foods and paper products every month through 2014, so she would have the monies to keep up her mortgage payments on her first-ever house and feed her three grown children. We're happy to say that our member has now returned to work full-time and the family is now self-sufficient.

And yes, we still have volunteers who do Meals-on-Wheels even though we do not manage the Fallston route anymore.

We believe that spending time with children and adults who are in need, is more important than spending money, especially for a small club with limited funds and stamina.

#### The Joppatowne Woman's Club, Inc.

The Joppatowne Woman's Club... now that is my kind of club! You know, like "Chicago is my kind of town, Chicago is!" Okay, on with the program... This time last year we did not have an Art or International Outreach Chairman. Well we now have a chairman for both, along with two new members. Our Community Service Programs are now complete.

Art Department—These ladies have contacted Johns Hopkins Children Center, where a child's life depends on donations from the community for their play rooms. Donations for the arts and crafts include items such as Sun Catcher Kits, Crayons, markers and much more for the young children. This center also provides items for teens, such as stationary, arts and crafts, scrapbooks, notebooks, journals and more. This committee will also be reordering polos and sweatshirts with our logo and white rosebud. Club members also received handouts from the Chesapeake Shakespeare Company, with a list of plays we may be interested in going to see.

Conservation—This chairman publishes tips on how to save on our water and electricity bills in our monthly newsletter. She collects blankets, sheets, towels, toys and unneeded pet medicine for our canine friends at the Humane Society. We made a donation to the Humane Society. Through the Adopt-A-Road Program, we clean our section of Shore Drive on Rumsey Island twice a year. We collect unneeded eyeglasses for the Lions Club, who give them to the House for the Blind. We conserve energy by carpooling to District and State Meetings. A couple of our members deliver Meals-on-Wheels. We donate to the Save the Bay Program.

This committee collects Campbell's soup labels and education labels from many food products, and collects receipts from a local grocery store's "Save-a-Tape" program, from which our club receives a percentage.

Finance/Ways and Means—The chairman of this program is one of our newest members. She has taken on this responsibility, like a queen bee leading her hive. We have had two very successful fundraisers and are taking on our third. We had a Cash for Christmas raffle where the winner received \$500.00. We had a bingo with Christy Swiger doing her thing, and now we are having our 6th Annual Tea. We would like all of you to save the date of November 10. 2015 for our Fashion Show being held at the Richlin Ballroom, with fashions by Talbot's. More information will be forthcoming.

Home Life—This committee will be delivering homemade meals to Anna's House, which is a transitional home for women and children.

Each committee member prepares enough food for their two homes. When comforts were requested, this committee was right on top of it. Members collected 17 slightly used handbags for Handbags for Hope, which is a fundraiser for Harford Family House, a transitional home for families. We held a Brunch with Santa at out local library and made a donation to a program called "Wheels for Work." A representative from this organization spoke at one of our meetings. It was a very worthwhile and interesting program. Six members walked in the Walk for Alzheimer's and collected over \$1,200. In February, for Heart Truth, we participated in a fun and very informative "True or False" quiz with questions all about the heart.

International Outreach—Our new chairman and her co-chairs have made contact with a couple of international companies, one of which is The Root Collective, an online shop with a variety of cute shoes, handbags and jewelry. The founder, who lives in Towson, works with artisans in Guatemala to get their products to America. They give back 10% of the profits to non-profit organizations in their communities. SERRV has connections with artisans and farmers worldwide. This is a 65 year old organization that is helping to break the cycle of poverty.

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Federation of Women's Clubs—the idea for which was first discussed in the Myrtle Club rooms—became a fact in 1899, the Myrtle Club was one of the 19 charter members. The General Federation of Women's Clubs had been organized and held its first convention in April 1890. Some 10 years later, March 1900, the first annual meeting of the MFWC was held. The Baltimore District was not organized until 1921. The Myrtle Club met at 312 St. Paul Street, and revised their bylaws in 1889 to say: 'The object of the club is the cultivation of sisterly feelings and mutual helpfulness among working women; the formation of classes for study; social enjoyment." Throughout the YEARS these have been our guides and our members now are former presidents of the Baltimore District.

R – is for the RESPONSIBILITIES we've taken on to feed the hungry, cover truck loads, support the Arts, help our schools, hospitals and libraries, Save the Bay and fight against domestic violence, among other individual endeavors.

T – is for the TIME taken to contribute and deliver food, personal items and cleaning supplies to TURN-AROUND; to make tray favors for Meals on Wheels; and to provide and change the door decorations for the residents at the Believe In Tomorrow House at the Johns Hopkins Hospital.

L-is for the LOVE shared throughout the years as we say GOODBYE to some and welcome others to follow in their footsteps.

E – is for our ETERNAL gratefulness for the people we have met over the years; for the worthwhile causes we have supported; for the comfort and caring we have nurtured; and for having been clubwomen throughout the ages!
